## ST. JUDE MATH-A-THON

St. Jude is the first institution established for the sole purpose of conducting basic and clinical research and treatment into catastrophic childhood diseases, mainly cancer. St. Jude continues to be the only National Cancer Institute ~ funded cancer center devoted solely to children. St. Jude has treated children from all 50 states and from around the world. The daily operating cost for St. Jude is nearly \$1.3 million, which is primarily covered by public contributions. During the past three years, 85.3% of every dollar received by St. Jude has gone to the current and future needs of the hospital. In 1962, the survival rate for acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL), the most common form of childhood cancer, was 4%. Today, the survival rate for this once deadly disease is 94% thanks to the research

and treatment protocols developed at St. Jude.

You may be asking what this has to do with our families at North Harford Middle School. The Mathematics Department at NHMS will be sponsoring a Math-A-Thon. Our permission slips and collection envelopes go home with the students on Friday 18 December. We are hoping that our students will see family and friends over the holiday break who might want to donate to this worthy cause. On Tuesday 19 January, we will be collecting the donations our students have received to help the kids at St. Jude.





If donations are ready, they can be returned to your child's math teacher any time in January leading up to the 19th. Please encourage your child to participate in this fundraiser. Every child who participates and gets pledges for the completed activities in the fun book will be able to pick prizes as a great incentive. Please watch for the information to come home through your child and support the Math-A-Thon so that we can participate in this worthwhile cause. With your help, we will one day win the battle against childhood cancer and other catastrophic diseases.

## INFLUENZA Q&A



What is influenza (flu)? It is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It is estimated that 5%-20% of the US population gets the flu each year; more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from flu complications—20,000 of these are younger than 5 years of age; and a range of 3,000-49,000 people die each year from the flu. Some people, such as older people, young children, and those with certain health conditions (such as asthma, diabetes, or heart disease), are at high risk.



How does the flu spread? The viruses are spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Or, a person might also get the virus by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it, and then touching their mouth, eyes or nose.



What are symptoms of the flu? Symptoms include: fever (usually high), headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough, sore throat, runny/stuffy nose and muscle aches. Stomach symptoms, such as nausea, vomiting and diarrhea can also occur, and are more common in children than adults.



How long is a person contagious? This depends on the age and health of the person. You may be able to pass the flu on to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick; from 1 day before symptoms develop to 5 –7 days after becoming sick.



What is the difference between a cold and the flu? They are both respiratory illnesses but they are caused by different viruses. Colds are usually milder than the flu and are more likely to have a runny or stuffy nose. Colds generally don't result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections or hospitalizations. Children or teenagers with flu-like symptoms should NOT take aspirin. In general, the flu is worse than the common cold, and symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness and dry cough are more common and intense.

\* It can be difficult or even impossible to tell the difference between the two viruses based on symptoms alone. Special tests may be helpful if done within the first few days of illness, to tell if a person has the flu.



What can I do to protect myself? The CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccine as the first and most important step in protecting against this serious disease. There are many different flu viruses and the flu vaccine can protect you from the main viruses (three or four depending on which vaccine you get). It can protect you from getting sick or it can make your illness milder if you get a different flu virus.

## **REQUIREMENTS**

Students entering grades 7 and 8 in school year 2016-2017 must have:

- One Tdap (Tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis booster)
- One Meningitis vaccine (MCV, MCVP4)

Check with your doctor to see if your child has had these vaccinations. Please do not delay; schedule an appointment to receive these vaccines or get documentation of vaccination as soon as possible. Your child will be excluded from school next year if they are not in compliance with these regulations.




# School Counseling Corner
